Other items of interest were several examples of a reproduction WE notchless dial plate that he has been working on for a long time. They are virtually indistinguishable from the real thing.

By mid-afternoon, people began packing up their treasures and getting ready to head back home. Everyone seemed to have a good time, and the show was deemed successful. Hopefully it will become an annual event. Thanks to everyone who participated, as a successful show depends on collector support.

**The Plague  
of Telephone  
Attachments**

**I**F ANY argument were needed to justify the Company's ruling prohibiting attachments to standard desk sets, assuredly it is presented in the illustration on these pages. It reproduces a collection gathered by representatives of the A. T. and T. Company. A detailed description of the attachments follows:

No. 1—Napp's Hurriphone: A combined memorandum pad and directory index which is attached to the upright of a desk stand.

No. 2—Automatic Directory: An index directory holder attached to the desk stand near the transmitter.

No. 3—Quick Action Memorandum and Card Catalogue: A combined alphabetical card catalogue and a memorandum tablet holding a roll of paper. This device is fastened to the handle of a desk stand.

No. 4—U. S. Telephone Supply Company's Long Distance Mouthpiece: A large metal mouthpiece with metal sieve, designed to increase the volume of transmission.

No. 5—Mouthpiece Support for Receiver: A metal punching attached to the receiver in such a way that the receiver may be hung upon the mouthpiece, thus closing the opening. The idea is that the mouthpiece of the transmitter can be closed so that what is going on in the room cannot be heard over the line.

No. 6—Telephone Lock: A padlock attached to go through the tines of the switch-hook so as to prevent the removal of the receiver and so keep unauthorized persons from using the telephones.

No. 7—Help-a-phone: A flexible tube about one foot long having an earpiece at one end and a connecting piece at the other end which is screwed on to the cap of the standard receiver. This device is intended to convey transmission to both ears.

No. 9—Instruction Plate: A celluloid plate having printed instructions thereon, which is held in place under the mouthpiece.

No. 10—Telephonine: A hinged metal cap fitting over the transmitter mouthpiece and carrying an antiseptic pad. The pad is supposed to be moistened with an antiseptic solution whenever required.

No. 11—Reed's Ear Cushion: A rubber pad provided with a metal ring which allows the device to be snapped on to the earpiece of the receiver. It is claimed that by using this device a better fit for the ear is obtained.

No. 12—Telaupad: A soft rubber cushion

which may be slipped over the face of a telephone receiver.

No. 13—Hygienic Telephone Shield: A cardboard holder arranged to slip over the mouthpiece of the transmitter. The holder supports a thin sheet of tissue paper which is stretched across the mouthpiece opening.

No. 15—Gibson's Glass Mouthpiece: A glass mouthpiece of the same form as the standard mouthpiece. It has a metal threaded ring in order that it may be screwed into the face of the transmitter.

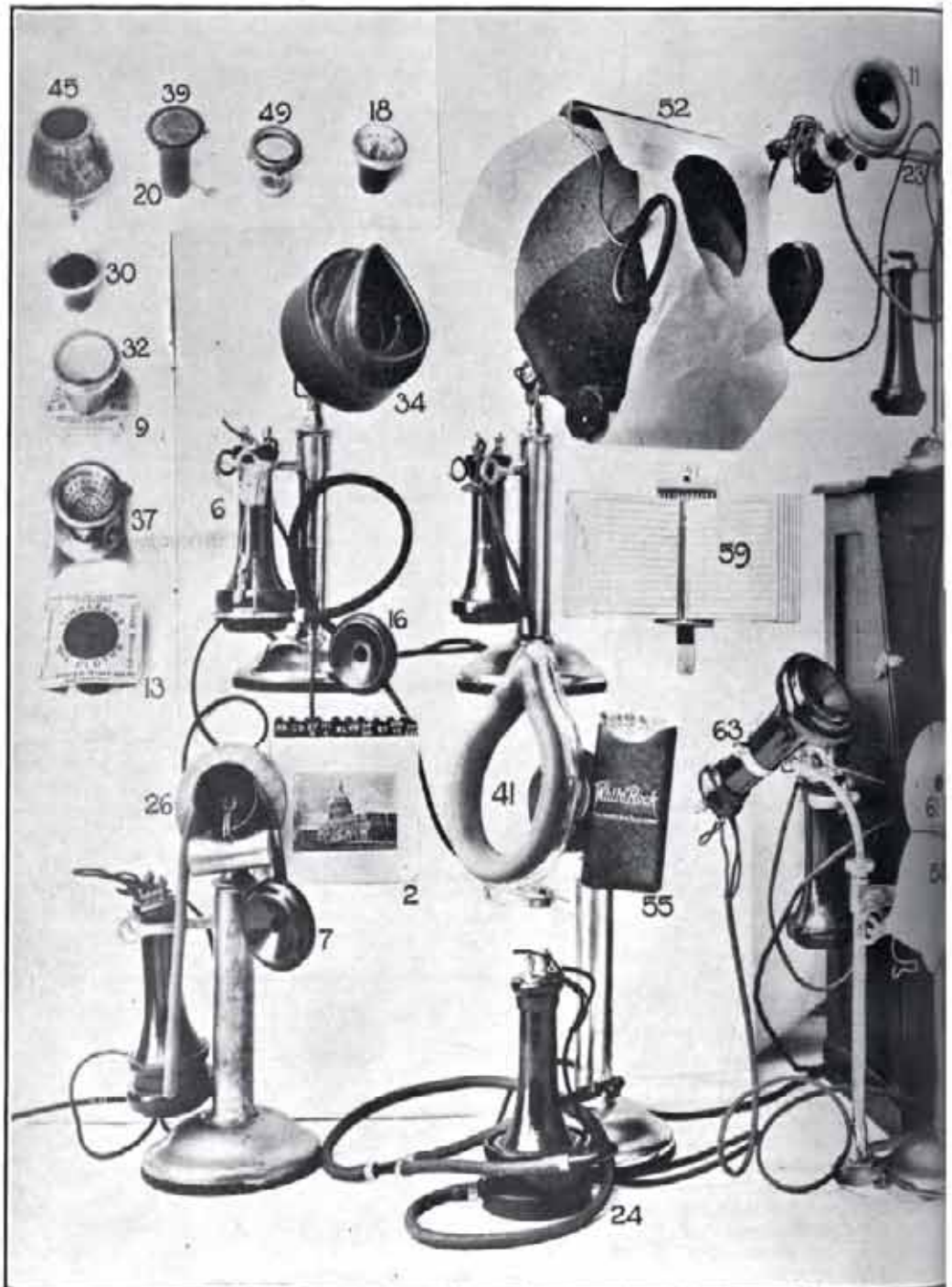
No. 16—Detachable Help-a-phone: A device similar to the Rector Help-a-phone, except that it is so arranged as to be quickly attachable to or detachable from the standard receiver.

No. 17—Telephonidex Company's Index Attachment for Transmitter: A pasteboard folder secured under the transmitter mouthpiece.

No. 18—Red Cross Mouthpiece: A perforated aluminum shell which is used as a substitute for the present mouthpiece. It is packed with a filling saturated with some sort of germicide. It is claimed that this device will kill all germs found in the mouthpiece.

No. 19—Eddy Auxiliary Receiver: A watch-case type of receiver to be used in parallel with the standard receiver for auxiliary receiving purposes.

No. 20—Telephone Noise Eliminator: An attachment designed to be screwed into place between the mouthpiece and the face of the trans-
